



Mambo (hello!) from Tanzania. I have been back on the ground here since late December 2015 and have been very busy working at the home with the kids and especially trying to get our building finished. We are 90% complete with the building and will be moving into our new home very soon. Such an exciting time for our organisation and the children are thrilled!



Since our last newsletter Nadia joined our family in November 2015. Nadia is Remy's sister who had been 'missing' for some time and it was only at their mother's funeral that she was brought back to her family.

As is sadly quite common in Tanzania Nadia had been 'sold' to do domestic work at a very young age. When she was only 5 years old she was sent to work picking marijuana and wasn't given any kind of education or playtime. When Nadia came to our home she was very shy and her language skills were limited. She hardly knew how to play and had trouble understanding the concept because she had never been given the opportunity to just be a kid and have fun. Nadia has slowly adapted to life in our home and is now such a happy little girl.

She is still shy but she knows she is safe and she loves getting to know her new brothers and sisters. It was wonderful to see her reunited with Remy and for us to be able to keep them together for the rest of their lives. We chose for her to stay at home for



the first term of school to help her catch up on the basics (numbers, alphabet, social interactions etc) and I am very happy to say that she started school in May this year. The teachers at school are giving

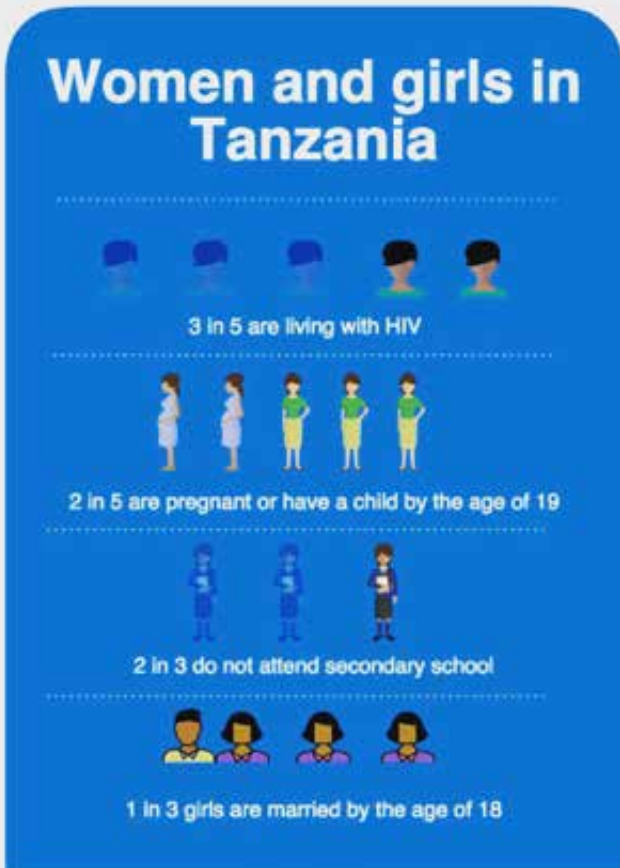
her some extra help two afternoons a week and she is catching up to the others in her class very quickly. Her favourite thing to do is colouring in.

Nadia's story is exactly the reason we do what we do. Before she came to our home her future was bleak and I hate to even think what may have happened to her. Now her future is bright and she has the opportunity to be anything she wants to be. This is what gives me the drive and inspiration to keep doing what we do and to expand our organisation so that we can help more children. Nadia's life has changed immeasurably and she

now has a chance to be happy, successful and to choose what she will do. When she was far too young those choices were taken from her and I am very proud to say that with your help we have been able to give her security, love and opportunity.

Staff

Our Mamas are managed by the incredible Fatuma and she does an amazing job! She is a single mum herself with a 3 year old and works harder than anyone I know. Since our last newsletter one of our Mamas, **Zuhura**, left to have a baby of her own, but we have been lucky to have **Sarafina** and **Latifa** join our staff to help care for the children. Latifa now lives on site with **Deborah** and Sarafina comes in each day to help with the ever growing laundry and cleaning. These women not only support their own families, but they care for our kids as part of their family as well. They are the ones who sit with them in the night if they are sick or have a bad dream, who help them with their homework, play games with them, feed them and guide them in the world.

I could not be more grateful for these kind and dedicated women!

We have recently hired a Tanzanian Project Manager called **Wilson**. He has a background in Business and Social Work and is a fantastic addition to our team. He is in charge of the management of the home and all of the legal requirements with Social Welfare, the Tax Office and other Government Agencies. He is a former street kid so he has personal insight into how the kids feel as well as extensive training and qualifications in Social Welfare. I'm excited to have him on board to help me and to assist in us taking the organization to the next level. It also means that we are now exclusively Tanzanian run In-Country, which is something that I am very proud of. That is a total of 7 paid staff in Tanzania (plus our building manager **Amani!**). We are here to create change in all areas including supporting the community and being a part of the change we believe in for the whole country.

With a new President at the helm there are a lot of positive changes happening in Tanzania which include providing better and more consistent services and forcing government agencies to effectively follow protocols and be accountable for their services. This is a much-needed change and is very positive for our organisation because it supports us more effectively and also allows us to be properly recognised for the work that we do.

School

Sabina our eldest was struggling in an academic environment and while we tried to help her complete her O levels it just wasn't right for her. We found a hospitality training course for her, run by an International Organisation called Jobortunity and she loves it. She started in November 2015 and did 3 months of school based training and is now in a system where she does 3 weeks on the job training and 1 week at school each month. The course runs for a year and she has very good potential to gain employment at one of the work placements when she completes the course. We are hopeful that this will work well for her.

As she is the eldest we are also in the process of developing our "Age Out" Policies and Programs which will also include Life Skills training to ensure when our kids do head out on their own they have the necessary knowledge and emotional readiness to manage it.

It's an exciting new chapter in what we do.



All the kids are going well in school and enjoying their studies. **Kelvin** and **Yohana** are quite skilled football players and often represent their school in competitions.



Remy and **Anjelina** started Nursery Classes in January and they are both doing very well. Remy is showing himself to be a force to be reckoned with at just 4 years old! He has already decided he wants to be a Doctor and while his first assessment at school wasn't great and he was put into a class that needed extra attention, he has excelled and was number one in his class at the end of first term. Remy didn't let his tragic past get in the way of his future success; he used the extra care received from the teachers and support from our home and now he's number one out of 38 kids. What a superstar! When Remy came to us he needed two major life saving surgeries as a result of neglect in the environment where he lived before coming to Ujamaa. The fact that he now wants to be a doctor is another example of the impact our home can have on these kids. If you ask Remy what he needs to do to be a Doctor he says, "I have to pass all the subjects!" We look forward to supporting him on this journey.

Building

The building has moved ahead in leaps and bounds and as we finish of the last few things we will be moving the kids into their new home in the coming weeks. What a fantastic achievement! This is the culmination of over 2 years work and is vital to the forward movement of our organisation. There are so many generous people who helped us achieve this goal and I am so excited to get the kids into the place that they can call home until they are adults.

Since our last update we have:

- Put in ceilings
- Plastered and painted the walls
- Finished tiling
- Installed windows
- Installed toilets, showers and hot water heaters
- Bought a new stove and fridge
- Installed all lighting fixtures
- Put on skirting
- Put in a retaining wall for the playground area
- Cut and cleared the playground area
- Made the perimeter wall higher

The installation of doors and wardrobes is happening now as well as kitchen cabinetry.

Only a few more steps to go and then we will be in our new home. I will send an update as soon as we are there!
